Introduction

Kupu Arataki

Our strategic plan sets our goals and priorities and will guide our mahi from 2021 to 2024.

In this strategy, Te Rito Maioha Early Childhood New Zealand is committed to supporting our students, our member services, leaders and kaiako, and the wider ECE sector by delivering:

- high quality tertiary qualifications in early childhood and primary education, teaching, learning and research
- collaborative partnerships, leadership and advocacy that contribute to high quality education for all tamariki, and better recognition and outcomes for the early childhood education sector.

We are committed to The Treaty of Waitangi | Te Tiriti o Waitangi, to be inclusive in all we do and say, and to be equitable, free from bias, discrimination and racism.

Our strategic plan will form the basis of reporting throughout the organisation. Progress will be monitored by Council, shared with relevant government agencies and with members at each AGM.

The whakataukī on the previous page speaks to our purpose, values and the way we work together to achieve our goals, each weaving strands of whanaungatanga, kotahitanga and manaakitanga into a tapestry of knowledge and understanding.

Education environment

Mātauranga taiao

This strategic plan was developed at a time when the Labour-led Government of the day had initiated reforms and signalled further changes that will significantly alter the education system in Aotearoa New Zealand, including tertiary provision and early childhood education.

The Education and Training Act 2020 directs the education sector towards actions that contribute to strengthening the education system. The gazetted objectives of the Government's vision are: learners at the centre; barrier-free access; quality teaching and leadership; future of learning and work; and world class inclusive public education. Our strategy therefore aligns with these objectives and government education strategies and plans, especially:

Increasing ECE services:

In 2020, the number of education and care services had increased by 7% since 2016 to 2,670.

Increasing attendance at ECE:

As of June 2020, 97.1% of school entrants have attended early childhood education. Children aged 3 and 4 participating in ECE for 10 hours or more per week has steadily increased in the last three years, but participation for Māori and Pacific 3 and 4-yearolds is lower and has increased more slowly.

ECE quality:

The Ministry of Education 2019 Annual ECE Return shows that in Education and Care centres, 63% of teaching staff are qualified, compared to 94% in kindergarten. Since 2018, ERO has strengthened its focus on accountability, aiming for ongoing sustained improvement and ensuring quality early childhood education delivery across all services.

Ongoing under-funding in ECE:

Government funding over successive Governments has not kept pace with inflation so ECE services are effectively having to cope with less. A review of the funding system is underway, and we look forward to improvements in the way and level at which ECE is funded.

ECE teacher pay parity:

The Government has expressed a commitment to deliver pay parity for ECE teacher. We look forward to improved funding in this area so ECE employers can afford to pay ECE teachers at the same level as kindergarten teachers.

ECE teacher demand:

The ECE sector is experiencing long-term issues with a shortage of qualified teachers placing pressure on services. We believe improved funding and pay parity will go a long way to address these issues.

Primary teacher demand:

Almost 3,000 newly trained teachers entered teaching in 2020. The Ministry of Education anticipates an ongoing need to help primary schools find teachers in some parts of the country, such as rural areas, and in the Māori-medium sector.

Ethnic diversity in primary schools:

The share of New Zealand European students in our schools declined from 50.3 percent in 2017 to 47% in 2020 while Asian students have increased their share of the school roll from 11.8 to 14%. Māori students made up 24 percent of the school roll in 2020, while 9.7 percent identified as Pacific.

Ethnic diversity in ECE:

Increasing ethnic diverse is reflected in the changing patterns of attendance since 2014 with Asians showing the highest growth. Other ethnicities have also shown high growth. On the lower end, Māori attendance has increased by 4% and Pacific by 9%.

It is derived from the traditional celebration to welcome an infant into the world of life. Hence one literal translation of **Te Rito Maioha** is *the treasured shoot*. It shows that the centre of our mahi is the learning and growth of infants, toddlers, tamariki, teachers and kaiako.
